■ Message from the Chairperson: Saving Village Schools



When I met Wang Haiping for the first time in 2006, he was only 12 years old. His father went out to work and never returned and mother remarried and left home, leaving the elderly grandparents to care for him and send him to study at Dasendian Primary School in Qinglong, Hebei. Upon my interviewing him, he began to cry and I could not hear clearly his talking. Yet his grandmother was even more distraught in saying: “this school will be closed soon, what are we to do?” Following the school’s closing, the child would have to walk one and a half hours to study at the central school,

or board at school. Where would such a poor family find the money to send their child to school?

In 2007, 11 year-old Wu Yunshan of Zhuanjiao Village on the banks of the Yellow River in the Loess Plateau of Shanxi, and a group of parents lamented: “Zhuanjiao Primary School used to have six grades, but was later reduced to four grades, and is in danger of being closed.” As the school did not have a fifth grade, he had to ride the bus for more than one hour to the central school and board at the school. Because his father had been injured on the job, he was unable to work, and his older brother went out to work at 13 years of age. These children all suffered the same fate, as the schools in their villages will be shut down, and without teachers and schools, the village will also lose its soul. As they would have to study in the faraway central school and board there, their parents also had to worry about their boarding expenses.

In 2007, under the strong demands of the parents, Zigen received the Dasendian Village primary school application requesting support for the expenses of the schoolteachers and scholarships for poor students, so that their village primary school could survive.

In 2008, Zigen received the application from Zhuanjiao Primary School requesting support for their restoration of the fifth grade so that more than 40 students would not have to leave their parents and be able to go to school in their village.

Zigen is supporting the allowances for the teachers of these two schools, and the local education bureaus are sponsoring teachers with teaching experience and providing scholarships to the poorest students. The schools have launched dynamic sports activities as well as drawing. Wu Yunshan's father is the leader of a local yueyang singing group and is the school's yang song and dance teacher; Zhuanjiao Primary School has restored its fifth grade, and has new life; an enthusiastic Teacher Zhao has arrived at Dasendian Primary School, and whole-heartedly improved the school's teaching environment. The school has launched an environmental protection curriculum, and the students are collecting garbage in school and planting trees, and designing waste containers. Through writing essays and drawings, the students have called on everyone to care for the environment. The school has also founded parent's meetings in which parents also participate in the school's environmental protection activities. The original students of these two schools have graduated, and new students have arrived.

Following China's implementation of the closing and merging schools policy in 2001, all schools in poor mountainous areas have faced the prospect of closure, and students have gone to school in faraway central schools. For the sake of their children, the young parents also left their hometowns. The experience of Zigen over these years allow us to deeply feel that giving reasonable allowances to teachers, allowing schools to have basic facilities, in addition to an environment that is integrated with their lives, and a health and rural curriculum and parents' enthusiastic participation will provide a lively arena for learning, and enable these villages to keep its children and parents and preserve its own culture and history. This is the experience of Zigen that I wish to share with you.

The stories of the above two kids and their families are not the exceptions, but rather reflect predicament of a broad swath of rural students and their families who have been adversely affected by the school consolidation policies in the past eight years. As of this writing, the Chinese government has just announced an important review of the rural school consolidation policy, with an emphasis on putting the welfare of rural students first. We hope this is the beginning of a substantive change that we have been working for.

■ Program Evolution

Overview

In the passing year, Zigen has reiterated its vision of an equitable, people-centered society that upholds sustainable development, and its mission to initiate and facilitate projects addressing basic needs. The strategy to accomplish that mission has been to focus on communities in China with the most concentrated poverty, and on specific groups with identified urgent needs, including children, women, the aged, and rural migrant workers.

We have insisted on the practice of comprehensive support in the fields of education, health, environment and local culture, integration of school education and adult education, interaction between schools and communities, and encouraging dialogue and sharing of experience among different stakeholders.

In order to put our limited resources to the best use and to build pilot and exemplar cases for others to emulate, we have re-grouped our projects so that more resources are committed to the carefully selected “one school, one village” communities, where more monitoring and interactions with local partners are done. Projects in these communities, as a result, are more effective, participated by locals in more meaningful ways, and have greater lasting impact. On the other hand, we continue to support a great number of schools and students from nine provinces, in response to their basic needs. Thus, the two pronged strategy of focusing on a smaller number of village-school pairs combined with general support for a greater number of beneficiary students has won us important strategic partners and experiences in project sustainability.

In response to the rapid changes in social economic conditions and government policies, Zigen is also adjusting itself to the new rural reality in China, and redirecting part of its resources from support of infrastructure and equipment to that of capability building and production of training packages. Based on the success of the rural teachers

training program, Zigen is in the process of forming a training department, dedicated to the training needs of a few focus groups, including rural teachers, rural leaders, rural women, and rural development volunteers.

Thanks to the effort of Zigen donors, volunteers and that of our devoted staffs, the project expense of 2011 has expanded to \$581,915, an increase of 11% from last year.

I. School Education.

Zigen continue to advocate the education of children at the elementary and secondary stage as a basic human right. The scholarship projects have continued, as some families of students are still facing rising cost of schooling, in spite of the implementation of “free education” by the government. As with past years, scholarship is Zigen’s most geographically dispersed project, covering eight provinces and one municipality. To ensure the continuity of students’ personal growth, and to set examples to other aspiring children, Zigen also continues to provide scholarship beyond the compulsory education phase (elementary and secondary, or one through nine grades), including high school, vocational high school, and the college. Among the 2,510 students receiving Zigen scholarship in 2011, 60.0% are elementary students, 21.7% secondary, 13.5 % high school and vocational high school, and 3.8% college. In terms of geographical distribution, the greatest number, or 801 students, is from Sichuan Province.

Besides scholarships, Zigen supported other school projects in 2011, including improvements of school infrastructures, donation of equipments, subsidies for teachers, improvements student dorms and food, extra curricular activities, training, and local culture heritage. Among the highlights, the reading projects of Xinzhou and Huangpi District in Wuhan, Hubei, the nutrition projects in Shilou County, Shanxi, and Fang County, Hubei, and the local culture and curriculum enrichment projects in Hebei and Guizhou are successfully done and popular with students. Counting both scholarship and other school related projects, Zigen’s support covered more than 170 rural schools (including some smaller scale, village schools) in 2011.

II. Community Development

The “one school, one village” program, started in 2010, is conceived to facilitate more careful planning, and broader

participation for Zigen’s project by concentrating more resources to a few communities with favorable conditions and willingness to initiate change for a sustainable future. The program is designed to strengthen the link between a school and the community it serves, so that the school functions as the learning center, not just for the children, but for all age groups in their quest for life-time learning. By emphasizing the connection of schools and villages, of textbook and practical life, and of classroom and local history and culture, the program hopes to promote the community as the center and motor of grassroots development, with the school as its platform for learning, sharing and participation in public affairs.

In 2011, Zigen supported fourteen “one school, one village” pairs. They are: Gaopa Village/School, Miaolan Village/School, Nanmeng Village/School, Sanjiaotian Village/School, Dunan Village/School of Guizhou Province, Zhuanjiao Village/School, Jiaopengyan Village/School, Tianjiacha Village/School, Xiaosuan Village/School of Shanxi Province, Tumenzi Village/School, Fengguo Village/School, Huaguoshan Village/School, Caochang Village/School, Dasendian Village/School, and Mazhanzi Village/School of Hebei Province. The direct beneficiary population of the “one school, one village” program is estimated at twenty thousands.

The program features projects ranging from health, water, environment, local culture, to children and adults’ education and training. The direct beneficiaries of the program for the fourteen communities numbered at eighteen thousand.

A highlight of the “one school, one village” program is Tianjiacha Village, of Shanxi Province, a remote, poverty stricken village. In 2008, the only village school, with 42 elementary students, was at the brink of closing, under the government school consolidation policy. Zigen’s local coordinator initiated a meeting of parents, school and village leaders to address the issue. They all agreed to make an effort to revitalize the school in order to keep it open. Many parents made recommendations on ways to improve, and expressed the willingness to participate in the effort. In that year, a fund was raised through a combined source of the local school system, village committee and parents, in matching Zigen’s support. Besides school improvement, projects supporting local culture, health and environment were implemented since 2008.

Besides the fourteen key village-school pairs, Zigen provide various kind of support to an additional eight villages in Guizhou, Hebei and Henan Provinces. Taken together and by category, project spending of community development projects is \$16,519 in health, \$43,560 in environment, and \$26,397 in other village oriented undertakings.

III. Grassroots Capability Building

In 2011, Zigen continued with team building, textbook compilation, and pilot project implementation in the area of training. The goal of Zigen’s capability building program is to develop fully usable and portable training packages for several focus groups, including rural teachers, rural leaders, women, and rural development volunteers.

Rural Teachers Training (RTT) is the most developed package so far. The textbook had been developed for many years by Zigen experts, and been used in several pilot training sessions. The goal of the Rural Teachers Training is to uplift the philosophy, values and techniques of teaching for the trainees, especially in achieving a holistic view of

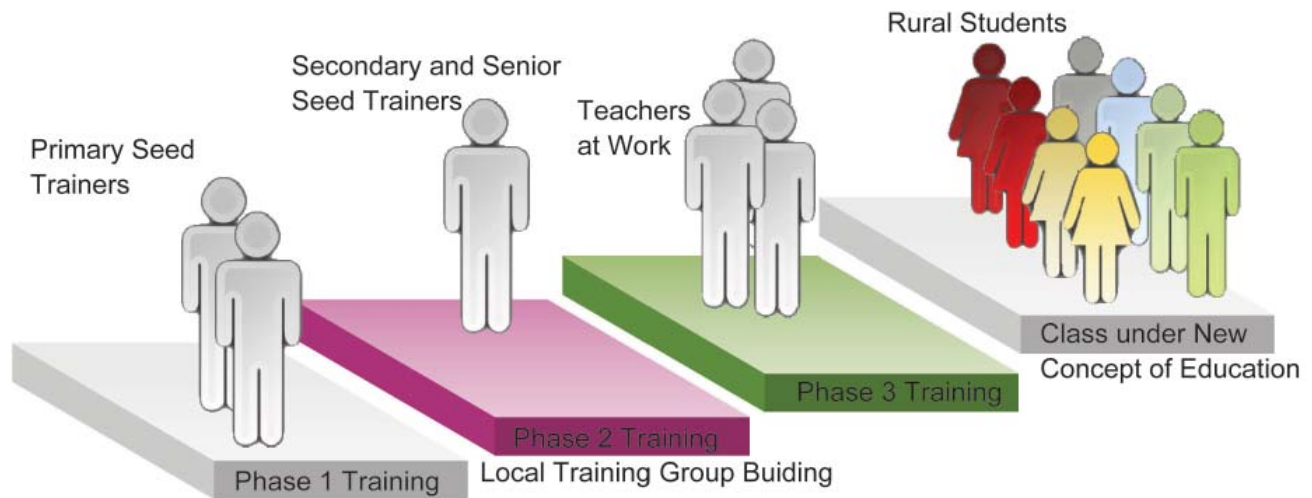


Illustration of Rural Teacher Training Project

education, and in seeing the connection between rural education, culture and community development. The training course emphasizes the importance of respecting rural students and their communities, and encourages a student-centered, participatory classroom method. The project is designed as containing two phases, one the “training of trainers” phase, and the other “training of grassroots teachers” phase.

The first phase of Rural Teachers Training has been implemented since 2010 in five counties of four provinces (Qinglong of Hebei, Fang County of Hubei, Lancang and Yulong of Yunan, and Wangcang of Sichuan), accomplishing the training of about two hundred potential trainers. In 2011, 46 trainees of the first phase participated a second training session, and started to form their own training teams. Qinglong team, the most advanced team, has started implementing the second phase training. So far 156 teachers from grassroots rural schools of Qinglong, Hebei have participated as trainees. More first phase and second phase training sessions are planned for 2012.

Besides the rural teachers training series, Zigen also supported other grassroots capability building projects in 2011, such as the English teachers training in Lin County, Shanxi Province, and a few volunteer trainings and project related trainings.

IV. Service to Migrant Workers Communities

Zigen started its program serving migrant worker communities in urban areas in 2006. During these years, the strategy has been to anchor the program at migrant children’s schools, build ties with surrounding communities, and to find partner in cooperation among the migrant workers themselves. A unique experience has been gained through projects promoting children’s and adults’ education. While developing and perfecting the program, we have also investigated and uncovered related issues and problems, building a solid case for advocacy in this area. When engaging the migrant workers, we remain loyal to our principles of equality, respect, and participation as practiced in our rural programs,

with a special effort in encouraging women's participation. Our strategic partners have not been confined to migrant children's schools, but expanded to include public schools that have significant concentration of migrant children. While supporting migrant children's schools with scholarship, libraries, sporting equipments and extra-curricular activities, and providing services to migrant families, the community center, now located in Shigezhuang Village in the northern suburb of Beijing, also involves a constant flow of college volunteers from all over the world. The program

has been quite successful in terms of building a personal network for civic minded people from all walks of life. The total spending of service to migrant workers communities in 2011, excluding scholarships, is \$35,236.

In 2011, we added several innovations to the service to migrant workers community program. One of the highlights is the opening of a thrift clothes store for migrant workers, which has been hugely popular in the Shigezhuang community. Our store staff even hauled some of the used clothes to the dorms of construction workers (housing more than 1000 of them) on weekends so that they can buy them with real convenience. Volunteers also helped out on weekends with the film showing at the workers dorms.

Another innovation in the program is an expanded scholarship, which covers more

migrant children's schools that are spread out from Shigezhuang village, thus covering more migrant children and their family in need. Right now, the expanded scholarship covers eight migrant children's schools in townships of Huilongguan, Beiqijia and Machikou, benefiting 160 students from migrant families with economic hardship. Twenty students among these have formed grow-up partners with twenty college student volunteers from Beijing.

In addition to scholarship, other projects benefiting migrant children, such as extra curricular reading, after-class tutoring, talent training class, were implemented in 2011.

V. Research and Advocacy

In order to better accomplish our missions, we have gone beyond projects in material and service support, and made an effort in examining and reflecting on the major problems in rural education and development, with the aim of finding solutions to the problems of and obstacles to sustainable human development. Thus, in recent years, we have been strengthening the research component of our projects, including baseline survey, follow-up monitoring and measurement, and impact assessment. This has proved very beneficial to our effort in need evaluation, project development, and learning from past experiences.

Besides project related research, we also identify current hot topic issues in the area of rural education, such as rural school consolidation, left-behind children, and difficulties facing rural students at boarding schools. In 2011, a special research was carried out regarding conditions of public services at migrant workers communities in Beijing. In 2011, 1.5% of total project expense has been devoted to research.

Zigen has also done significant public education advocacy work, sharing its experience of more than twenty years in grassroots development. Seminars, field tours, and movie showing were organized in both China and US with participation from the general public. In October 26, 2011, a special forum was held in Flushing, New York on the subject of Chinese migrant workers and migrant children's education. Zigen team, featuring Han Jialing, expert on Chinese migrant workers from Beijing Academy of Social Sciences, reported in detail the history, recent trend and current difficulties facing migrant workers communities and schools. The event was enthusiastically participated by Flushing residents and widely reported by English and Chinese news media in Flushing.

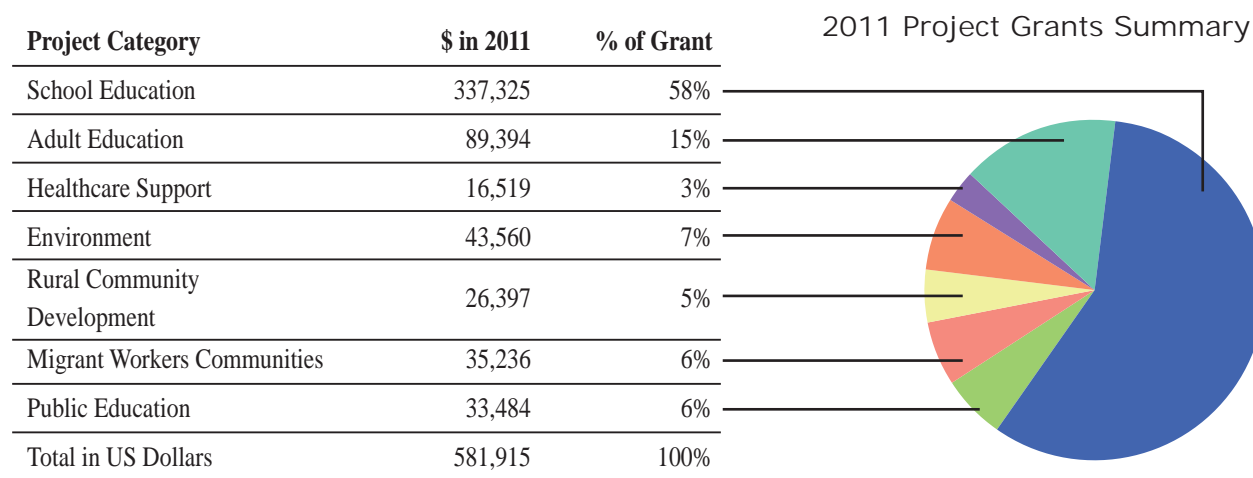
I. Donation Summary

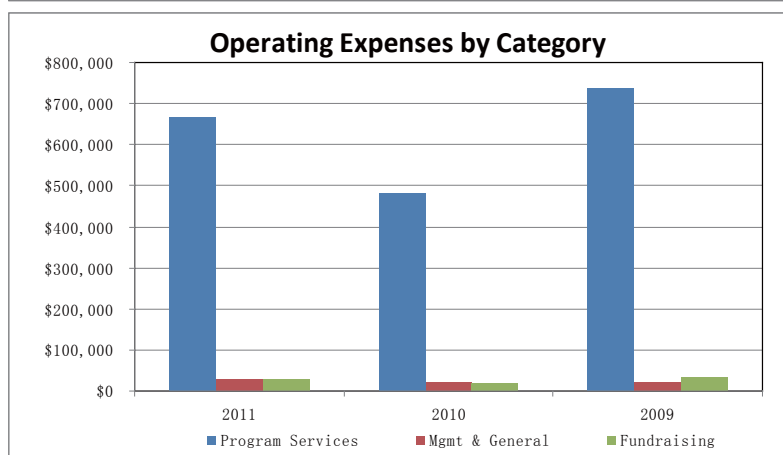
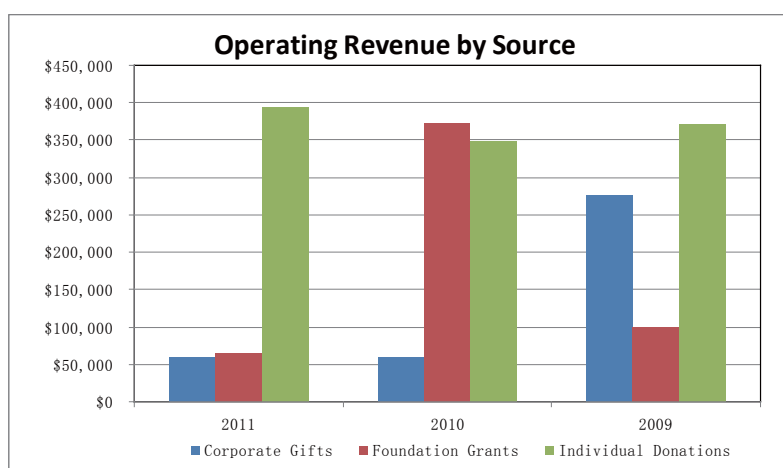
II. Project Grants Summary
