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Message from the President: Farewell, Queniao Primary School



In remote Leigong Mountain, Guizhou Province, there lie 9 Miao villages, in each one of which resides 500-1000 farmers. Upon the first time I hiked mountains and forded rivers to arrive at this place, I was very surprised to discover that all the villages had one primary school. However, apart from the central school, all the other primary schools only had 2 or 3 grades, and had very few girls, with some schools having only one or two girls, and some schools had no girls at all.

The most unforgettable was Queniao Primary School high in the mountains. At the time the school had more than 30 students and only 2 girl students. When I visited, only the young girl Yang Fang could speak

fluent Mandarin, and she became my youngest translator.

The reason so many girls were not going to school was that there was no free education at the time, and poor farmers could only borrow enough money to send boys to go to school; another reason was that the local schools only had 2 to 3 grades, and higher grade students had to study and board in the more distant central school.

Starting in 1989, Zigen supported scholarships for all girls in 9 villages, and at the time I represented Zigen in negotiating with the local Bureau of Education in expanding 5 primary schools including Queniao Primary School and Maoping Primary School to 6 grades and ensuring the primary school students could go to nearby schools. In the following decade, I returned to Queniao Primary School each year, and the number of students increased but there was not enough boarding facility, therefore Zigen supported the local village in the construction of a two-story dormitory designed with Miao characteristics. When I visited again each year, I always felt a special excitement to see from many miles away the school's red flag fluttering in the wind in the forest and to hear the chanting of the students as they recited their books. With all the school-age girls attending school, a solid foundation was being built for the liberation of the local women.

In 2001, China implemented the "closing and merging of schools" policy, and Zigen-supported schools were in a panic each year, not knowing which year they would be closed. In 2007, the fate of being dismantled finally arrived at these schools, when Queniao Primary School already had more than 90 students, with girls making up one half of the enrollment.

In one year, 6 schools were all closed and merged, and following their closure I did not return to Queniao Village. But each time I went to Leishan I would meet parents of the original Queniao Primary School children who would tearfully tell me about the hardship of their children having to go to board in the central school.

I remember in 2003, the village women created a skit and unhurled a small banner on which was

written the slogan: "We oppose the closing and merging of schools", but their voices were too weak, and the school was still closed.

Since 2001, I started to question the "closing and merging of schools" policy. I began to produce films, write essays and participate in many scholarly conferences calling for the reassessment of the "closing and merging of schools" policy.

After 10 years had passed, about 50% of all village schools in China had been closed, directly impacting 50 million student and their families.

In 2012, the National People's Representative Hue Weiwu formally initiated a proposal opposing "closing and merging of schools" at the People's Congress. With attention and reports from journalists and media, as well as the adverse impact of closing and merging of schools becoming increasingly evident, the State Council formally announced the termination of the "closing and merging of schools" policy at the end of 2012.

However, in the mountains of Leishan, these schools that were closed would never be restored, and children had to leave home starting in first grade and hike long distances of 2 to 3 hours to attend the central school. The Queniao Village Primary School dormitory was still there, but it was completely deserted, and the red flag fluttering in the breeze would no longer be seen again, the crisp reciting of the children would never be heard again. The children of Queniao Village Primary School, their joy and smiles full of vitality and hope still often appear in my dreams to this day, but I have never returned to Queniao again.

Based on past experiences, Zigen staff have set roots in the rural areas for a long period of time and have gained first-hand knowledge about rural education and development issues. We have identified important issues and given support (e.g. girl-child education, village-school integrated programs and village development). Our support is limited but through our experience we can raise public awareness through advocacy and research work, and issue policy recommendations. Our work is important, but it is not easy. We will make full efforts in carrying out these tasks more effectively in the years ahead.

Program Evolution

Overview

In 2012, the Zigen Fund strived to remain focused on basic education needs of rural children in China's underdeveloped areas, with an emphasis on integrated, participatory approach to village development, supporting the village schools in their roles as the central platform of life-time learning for all ages, the key link between local knowledge and culture and younger generations, and the springboard for sustainable development. We also continue to support other related projects that serve the basic needs for rural children, women, elderly and migrant workers. These projects encompass areas of health, local culture and environment. While our projects remained vital and welcomed in traditional bases in the provinces of Guizhou, Hebei, Shanxi, Yunnan, and Hubei, they have also taken holds in more recent and new project sites in Henan, Anhui and Xinjiang.

During the past year, Zigen continued to support scholarship, reading projects, English teachers training, and migrant workers centers, etc., namely, mainstay programs that we have perfected over the years. We have also experimented with innovative, pilot projects, such as village elderly association, village-school interaction, and special programs for migrant women and children.

Research and advocacy remained a vital part of our work guided by the vision and mission of our organization. Several years ago, Zigen's project and research team, led by Pat Yang, had done a thorough and detailed critical study on the issue of China's rural school consolidation. The study had provided solid evidence for the harmful effect of the school consolidation campaign in terms of raising cost for rural families, lowering quality of primary and secondary education, depriving rural children's local heritage, and removing a key component of village cultural and educational functions. In recent years, this important study has been duly noticed, cited and credited by important parties, including the academic, education experts, the media and government officials and agencies. Zigen's research work had, both directly and indirectly, has become the basis for public debate and government policy change on the issue of rural school consolidation.

Due to the economic downturn in the US, donations for direct support in China had significantly decreased in 2012, compared to the previous year. However, the full amount of the 2012 project grant of \$521,874 had been put to more effective and efficient use than before, as the Chinese government had offered matching fund for some of the project expenses in the provinces of Guizhou, Yunnan, Hubei and the Municipality of Beijing (The Civil Affair Ministry Demonstration Projects, see project list below). This had been indeed a breakthrough, as one of our long term goals had been that the government takes up the responsibility of satisfying the basic education needs of rural children.

I. School Education.

In 2012, Zigen's scholarship program benefited primary, secondary, regular and vocational high, and college students from a vast swath of China's hinterland, including provinces of Guizhou, Hebei, Shanxi, Yunnan, Hubei, Henan, Anhui and last but not least, Xinjiang Autonomous Region. The list of students who were granted Zigen scholarship were carefully prepared by local schools, village committees, in cooperation with Zigen workers. We made every effort that students with the most hardship and financial difficulties get the needed supplement money for staying in school, and made sure the process of reviewing their family and financial situations and the manner they received the money protect their privacy and maintain their dignity. Follow-up visits and strict financial procedures were deployed to guarantee the effectiveness and efficiency of the scholarship program.



Despite a shortfall in the operating avenue in 2012, we managed to keep up with the needs for financial assistance to finish school, and the total number of supported students increased slightly from last year, from 2510 to 2611. Of the 2611 recipients of Zigen scholarship, 58.1% were elementary students, 18.1% secondary school students, 20.1% high and vocational high school students, and 3.7% college students. In terms of

geographical distribution, the greatest number of recipients was in Yunnan Province, or 32.9% of the total.

Breakdown of Recipients of Scholarship by Geographical Location and Grade

The urgent demand and popularity of the scholarship program is demonstrated by the implementation of the program in three townships of Sinan County, Guizhou Province, where 154 primary and secondary students were granted scholarship, thanks to an ear-marked gift fund in cooperation with the Zigen Fund. Most of the 154 students were the so-called "left-behind children", whose parents were making a living away from home. More than 20% of these students were further disadvantaged by being orphaned due to the death of parents. One of them, a fourth-grade girl from the Qinggangpo Primary School, had lost both her parents and a brother, and was left with her three sisters, with her oldest sister in eighth grade. The family of another student was so poor that it cannot afford heating in the winter, so she had to move from one house to another in order to keep warm. If not for the Zigen scholarship, these girls were sure to drop out of school due to extreme financial hardship.

The predicament of these students is not isolated cases in Guizhou. It was reported that of the 8.53 million students in Guizhou province, more than half have family situations of economic difficulties. This percentage is far higher than that of other designated poverty stricken provinces which averaged at 30%.



In 2012, Zigen also supported other school projects such as improvements of school infrastructures, sports and art equipment, subsidies for teachers, improvements of student living quarters and food, and extra-curricular activities. Among these this category, the project implemented in Aksu,

Xinjiang Autonomous Region should to be highlighted. In this project, teachers and students of Aksu Vocational Technical College volunteered to tutor migrant workers' children with their school work, a project with the participation of many parties, including government agencies, school administrators, teachers, students, and Zigen staffs.

The total amount for school education project grant for 2012 had been \$352,207, of which \$311,748 are scholarship award.

II. Community Development

The "one school, one village" formula which Zigen has experimented in the past years continued to flourish in some of our project bases, such as in Qinglong County of Hebei and Leishan County of Guizhou. Most projects implemented there aimed at reconnecting rural schools with the local community, providing children with opportunities to learn local knowledge and cultures, and adults with opportunities of life-time learning.

In 2012, a total amount of \$16,894 was granted in village development related projects, spreading over Hebei, Guizhou, Anhui and Hubei provinces. Related projects in health and environment amounted to \$1,864 and \$6,917 respectively. The projects ranged from local cultures for specific age groups (such as children and the elderly), to water and environment, nationality heritage and women's health education.

The village-school interaction project at Mazhangzi village, Qinglong County of Hebei Province is illustrative of the integrative, participatory approach. The Mazhangzi village has 498 households and a population 1300, and a student population of 123. Right now, the village has a significant outflow and inflow migration, while native women and the elderly play an important role in laboring in the fields, orchards and rabbitry farms. After a need evaluation session participated by villagers and school teachers, it was decided that the idle space at the village school be used for agricultural technology training, including pig raising, rabbit raising, and fruit tree growing. The project would also support parents and students to raise rabbits together, and publish a school newspaper on

village news, agricultural technology and school issues concerned by the parents. A retired township deputy mayor headed a parent-village committee in charge of the project. Since August 2012, training was held in rabbit raising, and small scale cooperatives were set up. The Fengshi Rabbitry Company of Qinglong had agreed to provide the seed rabbits and technical consultation and instructions. Zigen's support for this project is \$2,926, or 18,500 RMB, covering the costs of



training (5,000 RMB for five sessions), the seed rabbits (7,500 RMB), and the printing of the school newspaper (6,000 RMB). More than 30 families had participated in the rabbits raising, while more than 400 families were benefited.

Another highlight is the water purification and conservancy project at Dangguo village, Leishan County of Guizhou Province. This is tiny village on a remote mountain range with 45 families and a population of 100. Securing drinking water had been a chronic and severe problem, especially during the dry season. The out migration of the male youth for working opportunities, leaving the elderly and women behind, had made things worse. The villagers applied to Zigen for fund to build a water purification and

conservancy system. In October 2012, \$664 or 4,200 RMB was granted. A plan was drawn up with participation of the villagers, especially six village elders. The system contains a series of six cascading tanks, with highest doing purification, and the drinking, vegetable rinsing, and bathing tanks each below. With this design, the children and adults will take baths with ease. After bathing, the water does not go wasted, as it winds down to the rice field for irrigation.

The system was built with the participation and cooperation of all families in the village, especially the stay-behind elderly. With Zigen's financial support, and villagers' contribution of 200 labor days and free transportation, the work was finished in a month. The system was put to use on December 10th, 2012, and proved to be a success. Villagers speak highly of its design, as it solves problems of drinking water, water for cleaning, bathing in the summer, and conservancy.

III. Adult Education

Zigen is convinced that education should not be limited to classroom and school children, but a life-long and life-enriching experience. Learning and training beyond the formal schooling and education system is a key to empowering the disadvantaged and to community development. In 2012, Zigen continued to work in this area based on its past experience and the operating structures it had built in the past years. We had been very

versatile and flexible in discovering new needs, finding partners and choosing topics and contents. The "Rural vocational and adult education demonstration county standard and evaluation" is a project in cooperation with the Chinese Education Ministry, while the "Adult education training project" was a grassroots one held at the Huaguoshan village of Hebei province Still, the English Teachers Training held at



Huangping County, Guizhou province was a fully developed, portable and popular project that we have done nearly a dozen of times at other locations. The total project grant for the adult education category is at \$23,072.

IV. Service to Migrant Workers Communities

As China's rural population continues to leave the land and enter towns and cities, the issue of their plights and rights has received national and even international media attention. Zigen, a pioneer in providing basic social services in migrant workers communities, has been in the past six years building partnerships in migrant communities, updating project goals and contents, innovating new ways to serve better, advocating for basic rights, and most importantly, working together with migrant workers themselves in confronting hardship and discrimination and struggling for a better future.

A main base for Zigen's migrant community project has been the activity center, currently located near Shigezhuang village in Changping District, Beijing. The center features a public library, shows movies several times a week, and offers tutoring and other lessons for free to children in the community. Zigen staffs at the center also try to reach out to nearby communities and residents, especially construction workers who live in temporary dorms at nearby construction sites. In 2012, a new community activity center had been opened at Shuangta village, located further north in the suburb, where more migrant families who have the basic needs in education, health and other social services. Besides these two community centers, Zigen also provide a fund to support several other grassroots organizations which serve and advocate for the migrant workers.

The total amount for 2012 migrant worker related projects is \$40,851.

In 2012, several innovative projects were initiated. The migrant woman activists training program aimed at capability building and confidence building among leaders and activists of migrant women. This was done through art work, organization of childcare and tutoring, and working with college volunteers. Another pioneering project was to recover, record and promote traditional culinary culture while involving women, the elderly, children and their parents and university student volunteers. The project hopes to promote pride and healthy life style among the migrant families. Still another grassroots project with a novel approach was a training of migrant workers in Chinese traditional medicine, with the expected outcome of enhanced health consciousness and medical knowledge among trainees, and compilation of training textbook and videos. The project also had a component for free medical consultation in the communities.

V. Public Education, Research and Advocacy

It has been a key component of Zigen's vision and mission statement that we conduct relevant research to identify the root causes of issues related to unmet basic needs and raise the awareness of the public.

In 2012, a total of \$80,070 was spent on research, public education and advocacy. A significant amount of research spending had been directly related to project in terms of need evaluation, monitoring and measuring, follow-up visits and report and impact evaluation. Another part of research spending had been issue oriented. In the past, we have completed detailed and comprehensive research on hot button topics such as rural school consolidations, problems of rural boarding schools, and life of migrant workers. In 2012, a comprehensive field study and analysis of migrant workers communities was initiated, with a focal field site in a cluster of four villages north of Beijing. The study was going to shed light on the plight and hardship of migrant workers, the substandard living conditions of their communities, and the total lack of basic public service or government provisions.

Raising public awareness and advocacy for policy change has become a more and more important task for Zigen in recent years. By working with government officials, experts and academics, and other NGOs and grassroots organizations, we had been able to bring overlooked but otherwise important issues, such as problems related to the rural school consolidation campaign, lack of accommodation and care in the rural boarding schools, and other problems relating to unsatisfied basic human needs in China. A great amount of effort were made to find out the facts, make analysis, call and attend conferences, writing articles for the media, shooting and showing movies on significant

and urgent issues, and making speeches on campuses and other venues.

Our public education and advocacy work had bear major fruits in 2012. In early spring, we managed to make contact with Hu Weiwu, a member of Chinese People's Congress, and given him our research summary on rural school



consolidation, along with our proposal for policy change. Hu was able to, with some other members of CPC, raise the issue to government departments. Through this and other efforts by many parties and stakeholders, the government made modifications to the school consolidation policy that had been in place for ten years. At the end of 2012, Pat Yang, founder and current chairperson of Zigen Fund, was chosen as the "Public Interest Guardian" of the "Persons Influencing China in2012" by *China Newsweek* magazine. In her reception speech, Pat Yang reaffirmed the positive and important roles Zigen had played in educating the public and helping to provide information with which government policy change can be made.

Donations and Grants Statistics

I. Donation Summary

In 2012, the donations totaled \$476,832. Our donor size was 393 donors/households or donor groups (note: we count all indirect anonymous donors as one donor since it is impossible to track the donor of each gift).


